

COMMITTEE UPDATE

NEIGHBORHOOD HISTORY

Garrett Street is one of the oldest roads in the Carillon neighborhood. In the 19th Century, this east-west thoroughfare functioned as a wagon lane that terminated at the McCloy & Shaw guarry at the edge of the large ravine that defines the western boundary of our present-day community. Early on, it was called Lee Street, likely for former property owner Susannah Lee (1825-34). It became the boundary line between the large estates of subsequent owners P.M. Tabb Jr. and Bolling W. Haxall (1850s-80s). By 1900, it was known as Granite Street, a quarry reference. The name was finally changed in the mid-1950s to Garrett Street (source unknown), likely to avoid confusion with the other Granite Street near Libbie Avenue.

According to Mineral Resources of Virginia (1927), McCloy guarry was about one acre across and yielded "a very fine-grained and even-textured, dark blue biotite granite, admirably suited for.... monuments and building." Our Carillon neighbor Dan Kalman recalls going to the site as a boy in the early 1930s and watching donkeys pull the guarry trucks. Back then, Dan did his own excavating: "We used to play down in there and get clay to make ashtrays out of it. We called it 'Indian Clay' because it was in all different colors—yellow, blues, and reds." In the 1960s, the inactive quarry was filled with dirt and rock excavated during construction of the Powhite Parkway. No evidence of it remains today; its former location is now the large city parking lot just west of the intersection of Douglasdale Road and McCloy Street next to the toll booth. More is included in Beth's Book, "The Carillon Neighborhood: A History".

Latest Update on the Carillon Place Development

As many of you have been following this story in our weekly emails, you may be aware that the City of Richmond's Planning Commission has approved One South Realty Group's request of a subdivision plan that would allow for the building of six houses at the corner of Rugby Road and Bute Lane (and the removal of the Vermillion property).

Many residents have voiced concerns about this development and have asked questions that many feel were not completely answered by the Commission. In response to resident concerns and unanswered guestions, the Honorable 5th District Councilman Parker Agelasto reached out to the City in regards to the appeals process. Information on how to submit an appeal was provided in these weekly emails throughout the last month, and due to the 30-day deadline, the opportunity to submit an appeal expired last month.

One resident did submit an appeal, and the CCA board unanimously supported the appeal and voted to approve a sum of money for legal fees. William Hartman Sooy, Esquire has been retained by the CCA to support this appeal. The purpose is not to stifle the new development, but to ensure that the new development follows the zoning standards set forth in the city code. The CCA will continue to provide updates on this story.

Renovation Project at First Unitarian Universalist

Two years ago representatives of First Unitarian Universalist Church met with neighbors to outline the proposed renovations to the church. The Church accepted the recommendations and suggestions of those present and has moved ahead to raise the money and complete final plans. The project will cost about \$2.3 million and formal ground breaking is expected to occur in September. The project will require a new electrical service to the church and that will be done in late August pending approval of the required permits.

Key components of the project are: an elevator to access the lower level; a kitchen, social hall, and five classrooms/meeting spaces on the lower level; renovation of the Great Hall to provide state-of-the-art sound and lighting systems; a new entrance way on Blanton Avenue that is welcoming and handicapped accessible; and a reconfiguration of space and systems within the building to include a staff office complex and additional meeting spaces.

The project's main focus is on the interior of the current building and will take about one year to complete. The temporary new entrance will be on Douglasdale. The alley way behind the church building is not expected to be obstructed during the project.

As the Great Hall (sanctuary) will be off-limits during most of the construction, worship services will be held on Sundays at John B. Cary Elementary School (pending approval of RPS). Most week day activities will use the current indoor meeting spaces.

Gallery, the annual fine arts and crafts show (mentioned on page 3 of this newsletter), will be held in late September as usual. Indoor construction (with the exception of the new electrical service) will wait until Gallery is over.
