Formed in 1968 to promote a stable integrated community during a turbulent era in the history of Richmond, the organization's early and ultimately successful efforts helped form today's active, caring, and diverse neighborhood.

Fellowship and remembrance was the main agenda for the Sunday event, complemented by bountiful refreshments, a continuous slide show featuring four decades of community images, and popular music of 1968. PET LAWS A BRIEF OVERVIEW

To avoid penalties, it is important for pet owners to know and comply with applicable laws. If you have had your pet for a few years, you may have forgotten or may not even be aware of some of the requirements. Additionally, these laws serve as a helpful reminder to be a conscientious and respectful neighbor. Please note that this is not a comprehensive list. For additional details see the Richmond City Code (Part II, Ch. 10) or contact Richmond Animal Care and Control at 646-5573.

<u>Leash Laws</u>: All dogs must be kept on a hand-held leash or confined within a fenced area when outdoors. Dogs are not allowed in many city parks and other areas – look for signs that state this.

<u>Animal Waste</u>: Pet owners are responsible for removing their pet's waste from public as well as private property. The waste must be placed in a plastic bag and then in a trash can with a lid. This continues to be a problem in our neighborhood.

<u>Spay/Neuter Laws</u>: Cats and dogs over 4 months must be spayed or neutered. Only a breeder with a current breeder's permit is exempt from this requirement.

<u>Pet Licenses</u>: Cats and dogs over 4 months must wear metal i.d. tags (at a minimum, annual City license and proof of rabies shot) when not indoors or on the owner's property.

<u>Microchip</u>: While not required by law, it is important to microchip your cats and dogs. Should your pet run away from home, this will facilitate a reunion. See your vet for costs and options.

<u>Animal Abuse</u>: Torture, abandonment, dog fighting, and other cruelty to animals is punishable under both city and state law. Report violations to Richmond Animal Care and Control at 646-5573.

<u>Nuisance Avoidance</u>: Owners are responsible for keeping their pets from becoming a public nuisance. This includes, but is not limited to, excessive barking and damage to property.
