We are looking forward to the changes that spring will bring. It won't be long before warm weather and spring flowers are popping up. Spring will also bring some other important changes to our neighborhood this year. There are two important projects in various stages of development that will affect our community: the City Stadium project and the Rugby Road/Bute Lane development.

Your input is very important. You should have already received a Public Input Survey for the future development of the City Stadium site. Thanks to the Block Captains, the surveys were delivered to each household and may be duplicated (one response per adult is encouraged). Community input is vital to this process and can influence the direction of the project and the long-term impact on our neighborhood. The options for developing the Stadium site are many, so please share your thoughts by returning the survey to your Block Captain at one of the two public meetings, or online at www.surveymonkey.com/s/Z697Y8B.

The second project in our neighborhood is the development of the land at Rugby Road and Bute Lane. Input from concerned neighbors and the Carillon Civic Association has resulted in the developer agreeing to address three major concerns:

- 1. Retention of the Marburg House
- 2. Lower overall density from 6 to 5 homes.
- 3. Decrease the alley access from 6 residences to 2

This project is still a work in progress, but it illustrates the importance of neighborhood participation and feedback.

Though we all know change is inevitable, we find that in most instances there are decisions and compromises that require our participation to find a solution that benefits the good of the neighborhood.

Think spring: Our Annual Meeting, Arts in the Park, and National Night Out later in the summer. Good health to all!

Author Kitty Snow will be our guest speaker this year. Ms. Snow is the author of "From a Richmond Streetcar: Life Through the Lens of Harris Stilson" (2013, Dietz Press) as well as Stilson's great-granddaughter. Stilson was a streetcar motorman who turned his camera on the city as he saw it at the beginning of the 20th century. Stilson's pictures are unique and especially valuable in documenting a rarely-seen view of working class life in Richmond in this period.



Ms. Snow herself was the first female C&P telephone installer assigned to several downtown neighborhoods. This unusual job took her to the streets (and up the telephone poles) of Richmond's oldest areas where she reconnected with the history of the city she loves. She will present an illustrated talk about her book.

CARILLON PLACE UPDATE

Castle Kanawha, the developer of the property at 3020 Rugby Road has submitted a preliminary plat of "Carillon Place" for city review. The plat includes five lots: four building lots and Marburg. William Lipps, who is purchasing the lot with Marburg, has already begun work on the property.

The Carillon neighbors reviewed the plan and met on January 29 with the developer. Several changes were requested including; improving the alley width, aligning the new homes more closely to those existing on either side and orienting the corner lot (lot 4) house toward Pump House Drive. A revised "Site Plan - Concept" dated February 3, 2014 showed improved alley width behind lot 1, and better house alignment on lots 1 & 2 adjacent to 3112 Bute Lane. At a second meeting with the developer on February 12, the Carillon neighbors acknowledged the improvements of the revised plan and offered reconfigurations for lots 4 & 5 to achieve the requested street setbacks of 35 feet and better house alignment. Negotiations have been fruitful and we are hopeful that suggestions will be represented in the next plan revision.

The developer submitted a revised application to the Planning Department for the March 3rd meeting of the Planning Commission and is expected to be on the agenda for the April 2nd Board of Zoning Appeals meeting.
